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BHCF General Membership Meeting Minutes - March 14, 2013

The meeting was brought to order at 7:10pm.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The Minutes from the January 10, 2013 General Membership meeting were accepted with changes to the *Crime And Safety heading* with Donna Kramer. A previous sentence of the Housing report was merged with her report.

Special Guests:

Pittsburgh City Planning- Andrew Dash

Andrew presented an update on the City's 25-year vision plan known as Plan PGH (www.PlanPGH.com). The plan has twelve components including transportation, housing, design and public art. He was prepared to talk about the Open Space/Parks and Recreation Plan. It was stressed upon him and all city representatives present that the construction of a new Davis Avenue bridge is the top planning priority of the community. This would fall under the Transportation component. The open space plan looks at all outdoor spaces used by residents and helps determine where our resources should be used to create what is needed for our neighborhoods at this time. Interesting facts that were shown included our parks and open space areas comprise 11% of the city yet receive 1% of the budget. Vacant and distressed lots comprise another 19% of land. Homes within a 1/2 mile parks or outdoor amenities have been shown to be more valuable. The Plan is under review and more public comment is anticipated. Pittsburgh Public Art Director Morton Brown was introduced and a working group from the community is being formed to keep progress moving on a new Davis Avenue bridge.

Report of Officers and Others:

President's Report – Pete Bellisario

Pete welcomed Father Schafer, pastor of the All Saints Episcopal church.

He also noted 3 candidates present who are running for our representative on the Pittsburgh School Board. A meet-the-candidates night for the School Board race was held April 9th at the Pittsburgh Aviary. A meet-the-candidates night for the Mayoral race has yet to be determined.

Vice President's Report – Roy Johnston absent

Corresponding Secretary's Report – Vince Pallus:

Vince reported that Board member Donna Kramer received another award. This award was given by Pittsburgh City Council, to her as a Proclamation for her 30 years of service to the community and veterans. January 29, 2013 was officially proclaimed Donna Kramer Day in the City of Pittsburgh.

Committee Crime and Safety – Donna Kramer

Donna thanked Council President Darlene Harris for her award. In Zone 1, Officer Plata is the Abandoned Vehicle officer. Pittsburgh code gives car owners 10 days after being cited for no registration and inspection before being towed. State law gives owners a total of 90 days with no notice. There is a possibility of removal from private property if the vehicle is deemed a safety hazard. Commercial vehicles are prohibited from parking in residential areas from 7pm-7am. The code gives them two hours to remove before citing. FYI: There may be a 3/4 way house developed in Brightwood. Last month there were two burglaries and four arrests for drug activity in BH. Crime watch will meet at the Goe Avenue apartments since Riverview Manor is under construction. Donna recognized Officer Forrest Hodges for his lifesaving efforts at a Penguins game last month.

Pete noted that complaints to the City 311 line are more easily traced when done online where you receive a control number.

House Tour- Kristen Priestly

This year's tour will occur on June 9 and will focus on the Cornell, Harvard Circle and Wickshire Street area of the neighborhood. We will feature chocolate and local artists at each home. Additional houses are still being sought and event volunteers and sponsors are encouraged.

Gallery Committee /Flower Planting – Susan Benn

This year we will plant our flowers in the gardens on May 4. Due to street work on California Avenue, the garden next to Rep Ravenstahl's office will need to be reconstructed. Volunteers are encouraged.

Susan reported that the Gallery Committee is planning an opening for their first show on May 8. It will run from May 8 to June 4. Three artists will be featured: Ann Heckel, Kent Nobel, and Dave Horvath. Hours for the exhibit are tentatively set for Tues-Fri 10-2, Weds 5-7 and Sat 11-2. Volunteers are needed to man the space and future show sponsors are being sought.

Clean Up Day - Tim Maloney

Tim will head up our spring cleanup day on April 20 at 9 am. The more volunteers we have the more places we can serve. He also coordinates the neighborhood "Adopt a Block" Program where residents pledge to keep their block litter-free on a regular basis.

Wellness Park – Kelly Day

Kelly reported on the conceptual planning for a wellness park in the Antrim-McClure-Fleming area. Utilizing vacant lots, a circuit of various activities and amenities would be an asset to that part of BH. This is being planned as part of Kelly and Vince Pallus's GTECH ambassador project. Grant money from last year's program has been used to purchase a bicycle fix-it station for use near Antrim, since the street is used heavily by those using Bike Pittsburgh maps.

Old Business

Pete reported that the decorative street light project in the California Avenue business district is almost finished. This project was planned almost 10 years ago and a total of five neighborhoods on the North Side have benefited. Local business owner Bill Kristoff wanted to express his appreciation of the top quality work done by city Public Works employees.

The Housing Committee is working on the revitalization of the 3800 block of California Avenue including the large home located at 3810. A member who is an architect has volunteered her expertise. At the same time we have not stopped working with the URA on Phase 2 of the St. John's project.

A question on the status of the church at Davis/Shadeland after the death of Pastor Hausen is still to be determined.

New Business

Andy McClaren reported that this year's Community Day at PNC Park will be held on June 16 with the Pirates playing the Dodgers. Tickets are \$25 and will include commemorative jersey. We will have buses to transport us to the game and a picnic will follow.

Pete reported that this year's Memorial Day service will be held on May 27th. All are encouraged to attend.

City Council President Darlene Harris reported on several issues. The Davis Avenue Bridge was on the TIP but was removed due to the replacement of the Greenfield Bridge. The design money for our bridge is there but the project must be placed back on the TIP. The business district street light project was started 15 years ago by Barbara Burns, but the money was moved in the budget. Two years ago she moved \$1 million into the project and five neighborhoods benefited (Troy Hill, Perrysville, East Ohio, Brightwood and BH). The new soccer field on Mairdale Street is scheduled to be ready this year and \$15K has been budgeted for the community center. She also indicated she has entered the election race for Mayor.

NSLC- Peggy Urzua

Peggy reported the following notes from the board meeting:

The NS Sandwich week event from last year will be featured on a new program by Rick Sebak. It will air on WQED on March 14 at 7:30pm. There will be a second Sandwich week this year from June 17-23. The NSLC would like to add 5 more restaurants to the event. There will also be a ticketed event on Jun 20th at the Elks with samples from the restaurants and beer for \$25. This will benefit the ROX program, which provides musical instruction for children.

The Education Committee is preparing a campaign to present at every meeting of the School Board to voice the opinions of North Siders regarding the handling of North Side schools. A representative would urge the School Board to act on the following:

- 1) Rooney must open in 2013-2014
- 2) Revisions must be addressed
- 3) The status of King Teacher Academy must be clarified
- 4) Manchester Elementary must remain
- 5) Social Service supports in schools should increase

Pete noted that Lori Bower, a neighborhood resident and Pittsburgh Morrow parent has volunteered to help represent us on the NSLC Education Committee. The Federation strongly supports our local schools.

Lauren Stauffer, of PGHretail, recently spoke with the avenue's business owners about the idea and are excited to report that everyone she spoke to is on board. Together, we will collectively promote the amazing things happening in the corridor, as well as, the community activities slated for each month.

In addition to the neighborhood awards, scholarships and computers are awarded to high school seniors who demonstrate academic success, intend to go on to further their education, and are volunteers in their communities. The winners for 2013 have not yet been chosen, but each year a number of students from Brighton Heights win these scholarships.

During the California Markets, local farmers, craft vendors, and food trucks will be invited to sell their unique offerings to the public. Brighton Heights businesses located elsewhere are welcome to apply for a space. Additionally, each month will have various progressive groups from Pittsburgh set-up to provide information about their work and how to get involved. Applications to obtain a vendor space will be available in May.

A special Service Provider "Good Neighbor" award is given to one non-profit agency working in the community providing human-services to Northside residents. This year that award will be presented to our Woods Run Carnegie Library for providing an extremely active environment encouraging full use of its staff and facility. They were nominated by both the Brighton Heights and the Brightwood neighborhoods.

Each month will have a sponsored event through one of the businesses on California Ave. and will be open for the public to apply. Activities include a BBQ cook-off, drumming tournament & parade, beauty pageant, and ecofashion show. More details and applications will be available on May 9th at the BHCF's general meeting.

New Preschool Opening in Brighton Heights

The JP Gallery for Performing Arts will be opening the doors to its second location in Brighton Heights in September 2013. Not only will the Center cater to extra-curricular evening activities for students such as dance and theatre classes, but will also house a full time preschool department during the day.

Unlike other preschool programs in the area, the Gallery will provide a unique learning environment where children will receive academic studies in language, mathematics, science and social studies, along with performing art courses in dance and gymnastics, music, theatre, and art. When a parent thinks of what their child's first school experience should be, they think of making new friends, exploring hands on activities that stimulate the creative mind, and physical exercise such as circle time singing and dancing, gym class and recess, that will contribute to maintaining a healthy body.

Unfortunately, many nursery schools and daycares do not cater to well-planned structured days. When defining the difference between daycare and preschool, the two structures are very easily recognized; a preschool's main focus and sole purpose is education, while a daycare is defined in the word itself, caring for a child (like a mother) during the day while the parents are working. Many (daycare) centers these days develop their own "academic" syllabus to help better sell their services to potential families. After all, who would want their child being at a facility for 12+ hours per day doing nothing more than what they could be doing at home, especially when a parent is paying big bucks for such services.

Early childhood years are the most crucial years for children. It is during these early years that children begin the journey of using critical thinking skills. They must learn how to build first time friendships, and work independently and in a group through structured play time and academics. Our new Center will help students do just that. We allot a specific amount of time each day for academics and specialized arts. Blocking course time for each activity ensures that students are taking the time to focus and engage in each subject.

The Preschool for Performing Arts will provide half day (9AM-12PM) and full day (9AM-3PM) sessions for three-year-olds, four-year-olds, and Pre-K. Each nine week session will conclude with a family event such as an art exhibit, music and chorus concert, spring musical, and dance recital. Other family events include an annual science fair and our "Around the World in a School Year" cultural exhibit. Our program focuses on both academics and arts, providing the child with their first experiences of school and extra-curricular activities during the day, freeing up valuable family time at home, which will soon be difficult to have once students enter elementary and secondary institutes.

Registration is now being accepted for the 2013-2014 season. Space is limited, so it is strongly suggested that families contact the Gallery soon to schedule a meeting and enroll their child. New Allegheny Has Turned 30

If you have been a resident of Brighton Heights for any length of time, you would remember the trucks that hauled dirt on their daily trips up Benton Avenue. Their destination was the 34 acres site now known as New Allegheny.

The City of Pittsburgh Urban Redevelopment Association (URA) obtained the site for a town house development in 1983. At the time this was the first new construction in the City in twenty years.

Eighty Three town houses are now situated on Brighton Woods Road with the six Cul-de-sacs which completes the complex.

New Allegheny is tucked away in the Northern most corner of Brighton Heights. The homeowners pay all City of Pittsburgh taxes including property, water, and sewage.

The City of Pittsburgh maintains the main street, but the other roads are maintained by the homeowner who belong to the New Allegheny Homeowners Association and pay fees that include all yard maintenance, snow removal in the circles, maintenance to their roofs, garage doors, home painting and siding.

A Board of Directors is elected by the homeowners and govern the complex by establishing policies and regulations.

Between the beds at California and Termon Avenues, those along Route 65 near the entrance to our neighborhood, the trees lining Brighton Heights Boulevard, and the wonderful new rain garden and street trees on Antrim Street, I would call us downright spoiled! However, these green spaces take a lot of work to plant and maintain.



More Community Updates From Council President Darlene M. Harris

I would like to extend my congratulations to the entire Brighton Heights community as well as the Brighton Heights Citizens Federation group (BHCF) on the construction of three new homes on McClure Avenue last November. The BHCF’s ongoing role in securing the means to facilitate further development in the area is a fine example of why community groups are so essential to the City of Pittsburgh and its well being. As the BHCF moves forward with plans to help further development in the area I encourage all of you living in the Brighton Heights community to join and support their group.

Residents of the City of Pittsburgh are now eligible for the free City of Pittsburgh Spay and Neuter Program. In addition to saving money on the surgery itself, City of Pittsburgh dog licenses for dogs that are spayed or neutered cost less to purchase. Lifetime (12-year) City of Pittsburgh dog licenses are available for just \$75.00 when your pet is spayed or neutered. Residents of the City of Pittsburgh are allowed to use the program for up to five household dogs or cats. Residents of the city are also allowed to bring in feral cats to the program. Feral cats are approved on a case-by-case basis and must be properly contained within a humane trap upon arrival.

Humane traps can be borrowed from the City of Pittsburgh Animal Care and Control with a refundable deposit of \$50.00 or from one of the program’s Shelter Partner Contacts. Please provide proof of residency, up-to-date vaccination records, a valid City of Pittsburgh dog license, and a filled-out application form in order to schedule a surgery date. For more information and an application form, visit the City of Pittsburgh Animal Care and Control website at <http://pittsburghpa.gov/animalcontrol> or call their office at 412-255-2036.

I am also happy to update the residents of Brighton Heights on the status of the Davis Avenue Bridge. Director of Public Works, Robert Kaczorowski, has confirmed that the Davis Avenue Bridge will be programmed into the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for the year 2013. Pat Hassett the Assistant Director of the Bureau of Transportation and Engineering in Public Works, has assured me that the Davis Avenue Bridge will continue to remain a top priority. I personally will also continue to pursue the issue and advocate for a workable solution in the near future.

As always I would like to encourage all Brighton Heights residents to contact my office if they feel I can be of any assistance. My office phone number is 412-255-2135. Please do not hesitate to call. I wish you all a happy and wonderful spring.
