If any member of the Brighton Heights Citizen's Federation would like specific information regarding the criminal activity in or neighborhood, you have two sources at your disposal:

- You are invited to attend regular meetings at the Northside Public Safety Council held the first Thursday of each month. They are held at the Manchester Citizen's Corporation Building located 1319 Allegheny Avenue. You may also obtain this information by logging onto the Police website at <http://communitysafety.pittsburghpa.gov/>. The next meeting will be held in March.

- You are invited to attend the Federation general membership meetings every second Thursday usually located in the auditorium of John Morrow School. Police officers from Zone 1 provide a comprehensive list of every crime that occurs within our neighborhood. The next scheduled meeting will also be held in May.

The best way to prevent crime in our neighborhood is to become involved.

Spring Means Getting Down to Brass Tacks on State Budget

Public hearings on Gov. Tom Wolf's 2017-18 budget proposal have concluded, which means it's time to get down to the nitty-gritty of crafting a state spending plan before the July 1 start of the next fiscal year.

However, we're starting with a bipartisan agreement NOT to raise the broad-based state sales or income taxes.

Another welcome sign is the governor's focus on working families and expanding opportunities for all of Pennsylvania, and not just a wealthy few.

The proposals include:

- A 6.5 percent Marcellus shale natural gas tax;
- Expanding options for seniors to stay in their homes;
- Expanding access to treatment and diverting those suffering from substance use disorder away from the criminal justice system and into supportive programs;
- \$75 million more for Pre-K/Head Start;
- \$100 million more for basic education; and
- \$25 million more for special education.

Under the governor's proposal, our public schools would receive the following subsidies:

Pittsburgh School District

- Basic education, \$160.69 million, a \$1.5 million increase
- Special education, \$28.55 million, a \$297,315 increase

Northgate School District

- Basic education, \$4.14 million, a \$66,767 increase
- Special education, \$896,498, a \$19,861 increase

North Hills School District

- Basic education, \$6.20 million, a \$120,127 increase
- Special education, \$2.39 million, a \$41,210 increase

The streamlined state government that the governor outlined in February would save state taxpayers \$2 billion. The challenge will be accomplishing those savings without jeopardizing state funding and programs vital to the future of Pennsylvania.

Achieving an on-time budget won't be easy. Pennsylvania's structural deficit is pegged at roughly \$3 billion between the current and next budget years.

And, a real wild card in the process is uncertainty over what the federal government is going to do with programs and policies that have a tremendous impact on Pennsylvania, such as the Affordable Care Act.

There still is a lot to hammer out, but please be assured I will be keeping everyone updated as the budget evolves.

There are many phone and email scams. Please understand that the IRS never calls you initially; you will first receive a notice via certified mail. They never demand immediate payment, and they mail tax bills.

Taxpayers always have the right to question or appeal the amount you owe. They never ask for a specific payment method like a prepaid debit card, a credit card or debit card numbers over the phone. They will never threaten to call local police or law enforcement groups to arrest you for not paying.

Be wary if you are contacted in this manner and report any phone calls to the IRS directly. They also do not contact

you via email. The phone call may sound legit and the email sound legit as well but they are all SCAMS.

You can also report this to your local police as well. You can only talk directly to the IRS if you call them. This important information was in a newsletter I received. Please be safe and careful and don't fall for any of the above.

Remember that we are the eyes and ears of the police. If you see or hear something suspicious, please report it to 911.

The Real Estate Report

Spring is always the busiest time in real estate, and this year is no exception. For all you real estate hobbyists out there — who check deed transfers in the newspaper, who walk the streets in search of new For Sale signs — you already know what I'm talking about. But for those of you who may have missed it, the top sales prices for the last six months in Brighton Heights Real Estate are as follows:

3514 Campus St.	SOLD 10/14/2016 for \$304,000
3951 Kleber St.	SOLD 3/14/2017 for \$275,000
1145 West Point Ave.	SOLD 12/19/2016 for \$240,000
1617 Orchlee St.	SOLD 3/16/2017 for \$215,000
1536 Pennock Ave.	Listed at \$239,000, sale pending at time of publication

Every year prices seem to increase, but this year prices have really jumped. Inventory is low, which means that anything good on the market is selling FAST. Even houses that need some work are moving as long as they're priced right.

Real estate investors have caught wind of the good thing we've got here and are definitely capitalizing on it. Properties are consistently being flipped in Brighton Heights, which is good for us because it means the housing stock is being consistently upgraded, and our streets are being beautified as a result. But house-flippers are now putting more money up front. As recently as five or six years ago, investors could still scoop up properties here for \$15,000 or \$20,000. That is no longer the case. So far, however, that has not stopped investors.

Over the past few years, I have seen an increase in first-time home buyers moving into the neighborhood. These are typically 20- or 30-somethings who want to be close to downtown, don't want to pay the higher property taxes of the suburbs, and like the short commute to work (whether by car, bus, or bike). Many of the buyers I have worked with have also mentioned that they love being so close to River View Park, the businesses of McKnight Rd, the stadiums, the river front trail, our new coffee shop, and so on.



What does this mean for us as citizens of Brighton Heights? Most importantly, it means that our home values are increasing every year, sometimes by more than you might expect.

In practical terms, this means that if you want to refinance, now is the time to do it. An appraisal now will most likely come back higher than it would have five years ago, meaning you have more equity in your home and may be eligible for better terms and rates on home loans. Many people do not realize this, but most banks will refinance a purchase mortgage with a fixed-rate home equity installment loan with very low (or no) closing costs. This is also a great way to get out of making PMI payments. If you think your house's value has increased since you got your mortgage, it's probably a good idea to talk to a local banker about refinancing with a home equity installment loan.

Living in a neighborhood with rapidly rising house prices also means that, if you're considering selling, now is a good time to do it. And if you're considering buying, you'd better act fast!

Every year I get excited to see more and more new people walking their dogs or pushing strollers. More neighbors to meet! It's also so nice to talk to people who are as excited to live in this neighborhood as I am. As I tell all my clients, I have the sense of community here, where I've now lived for seven years, that I never had in the neighborhood where I grew up. Brighton Heights is a special place, filled with interesting people—Old Pittsburghers, New Pittsburghers, and everyone in between. I could go on and on (and I usually do), but I don't have to because if you're reading this, you're a Brighton Heights resident and you already know how great this neighborhood is.
