The recent Government shutdown lasted over 30 days. CNBC reported that nearly 1,800 furloughed employees started GoFundMe campaigns. GoFundMe launched its own Government Shutdown Relief Fund to aid the National Diaper Bank Network, and chefs worked around the clock to feed those struggling. Regardless of your political affiliation, it's deeply upsetting to watch this situation impact innocent families. But it helps to remember that Pittsburgh has a big heart.

For those in need of a little extra support (because of the shutdown or for any other reason), there is the Northside Food Pantry, run by Northside Common Ministries. Located at 1601 Brighton Road and serving people living in zip codes 15212, 15214, and 15233, the pantry is open Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9:30 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. Those visiting for the first time should try to bring a photo ID, a Social Security Number, and documents that can be used to verify address and income. Please call 412-323-1163 for more information.

Furthermore, teens at Perry High School operate a studentrun food pantry. The Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank donates over 1,000 pounds of food each week, and students from the Junior ROTC, the Gender Sexuality Alliance, and the nursing education program unpack the boxes. Teachers keep classrooms stocked with items, and the students recently launched a "pop-up market" for families who could use grocery staples, fresh fruits and veggies, and frozen meat.

Gardens And Greenspaces


Most neighborhoods have a community garden or two. If you count the small ones, Brighton Heights has a dozen! Here is a list (in no particular order) to inspire you after a long cold winter:

- PA 65 at Brighton Heights Blvd. a mix of annuals and ornamental grasses funded by the Western PA Conservancy;
- the Great Wall along Brighton Heights Blvd. a mix of trees, shrubs, grasses, and perennials;
- Green-up Lot at Termon and California Avenues our largest garden with a mix of trees, shrubs, grasses, perennials and annuals;
- Adams Lot, the second garden at Termon and California Avenues – featuring annuals, perennials, shrubs, and a rock garden nicknamed "The Brighton Height";
- Bears Lot, the third garden at Termon and California Avenues – perennials and shrubs hide two cement bear statues during the growing season;
- Allegheny Highlands Lot on California Avenue opposite Benton Avenue – features plants and shrubs native to western PA;
- Legion Park our gem, with trees, annuals, and grasses that enhance the site of most of the BHCF's outdoor activities;
- Goe Garden, a small traffic island at Goe Avenue and Wapello Street – mostly perennials;
- Antrim Street Rain Garden where Fleming Avenue becomes Richardson Avenue – a mix of trees, shrubs and perennials;
- McClure Garden at Woods Run Avenue perennials and a rock garden are the main features on a slope to the gravel parking area;
- Kaboom Playground Planter Boxes some annuals and perennials in boxes around the playground at the Rooney School;
- McClure Senior Center newly established last year.

Each of these is a work in progress. How much progress depends on our volunteers. Kudos to the cadre of folks who keep Legion Park (our only City park) looking great. Most of the others are in roadway rights-of-ways or formerly abandoned lots and could use all the help they can get.

Pick your favorite and resolve to pull a weed (by the roots, please) or pick up some liter when you can. If you want to be involved, every Saturday in May, we'll be preparing or planting the beds for our splash of annuals. Thanks, it'll make a difference.

Also, this year BHCF will sponsor a sale where you can add your personal flower order to the Federation's to get the same high quality plants for your own yard. Keep an eye out for details to follow on other social media.





What You Need To Know About Voting

Voter Registration and Local Election Info

2019 is a very important election year for our neighborhood. We have important city and county seats that are up for re-election in the very near future! Here is some helpful information to help you prepare for these upcoming elections. In a nutshell, here's what you need to know:

- 1. Register to vote/verify your polling place/change your party affiliation by April 22, 2019
- 3. Know who is running
- 4. Vote in the Primary election on May 21, 2019
- 5. Vote in the General election on November 5, 2019

How Do You Do All of That?

Voter Registration: For starters to register to vote, you can go to **www.alleghenycounty.us/elections** and register online. Not only can you register there, you can also verify your registration and your polling place, which is **STRONGLY RECOMMENDED!** If you do not have access to a computer, you can get a voter registration form at the Board of Elections downtown, at 542 Forbes Ave #601. Many public libraries have voter registration forms.

Absentee Voter: If you are temporarily out of town, but want to cast your vote, you can request an absentee voter ballot. You can also call the Board of Elections and request that one be mailed to you. This is ideal for students whose permanent residence is in this district who are attending college out of state, or people serving in the military.

Know Who is Running: Many people don't vote because they don't know who is running or they haven't done their homework prior to election day. By the time you read this, we'll be more than two months away from the Primary. TWO MONTHS! That is plenty of time to google the candidates and get an idea where they stand. There will also be events around town for you to meet the candidates in person!

Here is a List of Open Seats:

- · City Council District 1
- County Council District 13
- District Attorney
- · County Controller
- · County Treasurer
- County Executive

Both the incumbents and their challengers are required to file petitions to get on the ballot. This starts February 19 and must be completed by March 12. Don't be surprised if candidates or people helping their campaign show up at your door, asking you to sign their petition. This is normal, it is required, and it is a great way to exercise your civic duty!

Important Dates:

February 19: Petition season starts. Candidates get their required signatures to be added to the ballot.

March 12: The deadline for candidates to file.

Primary Election

May 14: Deadline to apply for an absentee ballot

May 17: Last day absentee ballots are received

May 21: Primary Election Day

General Election

May 22: First day to register to vote, if you are not registered

October 29: deadline to apply for absentee ballot

November 1: Last Day absentee ballots are received.

November 5: Election Day!

PPC CEO Jane Miller, joined by staff and Board President Dan Booker made a presentation concerning the state of our city parks, both regional and others during their "listening tour". The purpose of this outreach and survey is to get resident input to form funding strategies to address the parks needs and backlog of capital investments.

Oliver updated residents on the city's critical care point-person for homeless issues and the Christmas tree recycling effort at the Jack Stack parking lot.
