If any member of the Brighton Heights Citizens Federation would like specific information regarding the criminal activity in or neighborhood, you have two sources at your disposal:

- You are invited to attend regular meetings at the Northside Public Safety Council held the first Thursday of each month. They are held at the Manchester Citizen's Corporation Building located 1319 Allegheny Avenue.
 You may also obtain this information by logging onto the Police website at http://communitysafety.pittsburghpa.gov/. The next meeting will be held in March.
- You are invited to attend the Federation general membership meetings every second Thursday usually located in the auditorium of John Morrow School. Police officers from Zone 1 provide a comprehensive list of every crime that occurs within our neighborhood. The next scheduled meeting will also be held in March.

The best way to prevent crime in our neighborhood is to become involved.

From Councilman Bobby Wilson

Hello everyone!

It has been an exciting and busy two months since I took office. So far, I have met with the directors of many of the City of Pittsburgh's



departments and learned how I can make sure that these departments are working for you. I have also had productive conversations with the directors of the Housing Authority, Pittsburgh Water & Sewer Authority (PWSA) and the Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA). I was especially surprised to learn how many homeowners have not responded to PWSA's effort to replace lead lines in their neighborhoods. PWSA makes multiple attempts to contact homeowners, and my office shall be working with neighborhood groups like yours to make final contact attempts with homeowners to ensure that they have every chance to get their lead lines replaced. Lead line replacements are necessary and will dramatically decrease the possibility of high amounts of lead in your drinking water. A great aspect of these replacements is that 98% of the homes will not have their yard torn up because PWSA simply attaches a new line to the old one and pulls in a new copper one. Please visit lead.pgh2o.com to find out where the latest lead line replacements are being done and resources to find lead line replacement resources.

It was nice to see many of you at the January community group meeting where I appreciated the opportunity to introduce myself and hear your immediate concerns for Brighton Heights and the improvements you would like to see. From that meeting, I became aware that speeding cars and dangerous intersections were of great concern. I'm committed to working with the City and you to make improvements to your streets so that they are safe and accessible to everyone. If you would like to get started on these traffic calming improvements, please visit https://pittsburghpa.gov/domi/traffic-calming to request measures to make your street safer and slow down those speeding cars.

If there is something you'd like us to discuss in the next issue of Brighton Heights' newsletter, please let us know by phone or email. We look forward to meeting and hearing from all of you.



Gardens and Greenspaces

Tired of winter? Me too. Don't worry, Daylight Savings Time starts on Sunday, March 8 and the first day of Spring is Thursday, March 19!

Last year our BHCF Flower Sale was a tremendous success so we will do it again. An order form is included with this newsletter. You can also pick up order forms at the BHCF General Meeting on Thursday March 12, online, or at the BHCF office. Orders are due with your check (payable to BHCF) or by PayPal online by Wednesday, April 8.

Flowers will be delivered to Brighton Heights on Thursday, May 14 and distributed on May 14 and 15. If you are interested in a hanging basket as a May 10/Mother's Day gift, let us know when ordering. I will make a special trip the week before to pick up special orders and my own veggie plants.

Hanging baskets can also be ordered for delivery on May 14. I always have said that you can find flats a bit cheaper at a big box retailer or supermarket but you can't beat the quality of our flowers. They are locally grown at Mussig's Greenhouse in Zelienople, and are packed and delivered on the same day. Plus your retail price makes a small contribution to fund other BHCF programs and the volume order allows us to buy the Federation's community garden flowers at the wholesale price.

Still thinking Spring? Earth Day is April 22 and we will "celebrate" that on Saturday, April 25 with our annual Spring litter cleanup. Thanks to Tim Maloney for leading this endeavor.

Our community gardens get going in May. Every Saturday we have a major activity scheduled:

- **SATURDAY, MAY 2** is planting at the WPC Garden at PA 65 and Brighton Heights Blvd. The Conservancy does the prep work and provides the flowers and mulch. We just have to plug 'em, plant 'em, and mulch 'em.
- **SATURDAY, MAY 9** is prep day at Legion Park and the Termon & California Avenues. We'll be transplanting spreading perennials, pruning, weeding, and preparing the beds for planting.
- **THURSDAY, MAY 14** at noon is the flower delivery to Brighton Heights. Anyone available in the afternoon to help unload the truck, sort orders, pick up or deliver flats will be greatly appreciated. Also, remember the BHCF General Meeting is at 7:00 p.m.

- **SATURDAY, MAY 16** is planting and mulching at Legion Park and the T&C 3.
- FRIDAY, MAY 22 folks will be "planting" flags on veteran's graves at Highwood Cemetery. Please help if you can.
- **SATURDAY, MAY 23** we will catch up on any unfinished tasks at Legion Park, the T&C 3, and any of our other community gardens.
- MONDAY, MAY 25 is Memorial Day! Enjoy the flowers and program at Legion Park and the luncheon afterwards.

Also, since this is the Gardens and Greenspace Committee, we always have extra spreading perennials (like Lambs Ears and Blue Bachelors Buttons) and seeds saved from last year's flowers (Marigolds, Zinnias, Rudbeckia) available to beautify your personal greenspaces. Talk to me at one of our volunteer days.

Finally, we have a dozen large and small community gardens. We can always use more help. If these Saturday volunteer days don't work for you, you can help out on your own time and schedule at a planter box near you. Let's talk.



Politically Correct 2020!

A Guide to Upcoming Elections, New Rules and Important Information!

Election season is upon us! While many Americans might be focused on what is happening on a national level, I want to remind the good people of Brighton Heights that this upcoming Primary involves important local races too! In order to be prepared, here is some important info and dates to bear in mind:

• APRIL 13, 2020

Deadline to register, update your voter registration if you've moved, changed your last name, or want to change party affiliation;

• APRIL 21, 2020

Deadline to submit mail-in and absentee ballot applications (Pennsylvania voters who can't vote in person, now have more options!);

• APRIL 28, 2020

Primary Election Day!- Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Mail-in and absentee ballots must be received by 8 p.m.;

• *WWW.VOTESPA.COM* is your go-to website for mail-in and absentee ballot application. Or call the Allegheny Board of Elections for mailed hard copies at 412-350-4500.

VOTER REGISTRATION

When you visit www.votespa.com you can also verify and/ or update your voter registration, change your party affiliation, and find your polling place, which is STRONGLY RECOMMENDED! Polling locations can change! Also, you MUST update your registration if you've moved or recently changed your last name. If you just got married and now have a new last name, update your registration or you will be stuck on election day!!

If you do not have access to a computer, you can get a voter registration form at the Board of Elections Downtown at 542 Forbes Avenue #601. Many public libraries have voter registration forms, and if that is still inconvenient, call the Allegheny County Board of Elections and ask them to mail one to you. Their phone number is 412-350-4500.



KNOW WHO IS RUNNING

Many people don't vote because they don't know who is running or they haven't done their homework prior to election day. By the time you read this, we'll be about two months away from the Primary. TWO MONTHS! That is plenty of time to Google the candidates and get an idea where they stand. There will also be events around town for you to meet the candidates in person! GO TO THESE EVENTS!

Here is a list of open seats that impact Brighton Heights Voters from local to national:

- PA House District 20 (Most of Brighton Heights is in this district)
- PA House District 19 (A little bit of Brighton Heights is this district)
- PA Attorney General
- PA Auditor General
- US House Pennsylvania Senate District 18
- President of the US

MINUTES

Review of Previous General Membership Meeting

January 9, 2020

The meeting was brought to order at 7:00 p.m.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The Minutes from the November 14, 2019, General Membership meeting were approved without corrections.

Special Guests:

Pittsburgh Police Sgt. Mike Burford

Sgt. Burford presented crime statistics for the recent month, updated members on several incidents and took member questions concerning dog waste issues.

State Representative Jake Wheatley Jamie Younger

Jamie reported on the Pathway to Pardon event process and House Bill 80 which will help restore driver licenses to those who have completed their sentences.

State Representative Adam Ravenstahl

Adam reported on a state grant of \$200,000 that was made to the Riverview Park Mairdale entrance project and the process for seniors to receive their new Connect Card bus passes. A shredding event will be held in the spring.

Public Safety Department John Tokarski

John reported on the start of the next Citizens Police Academy on February 6 and the next Student Police Academy, both of which to be held at the Jewish Community Center. The next city-wide public safety meeting will be held in April.

City Councilman Bobby Wilson

Bobby introduced himself and his chief of staff, Mohammed Barny, as our new council member takes office and took questions concerning traffic issues.
