You may also obtain this information by logging onto the Police website at http://communitysafety.pittsburghpa.gov/. The next meeting will be held in November.
- You are invited to attend the Federation general membership meetings every second Thursday usually located in the auditorium of John Morrow School. Police officers from Zone 1 provide a comprehensive list of every crime that occurs within our neighborhood. The next scheduled meeting will also be held in November.

Gardens and Greenspaces

Happy November! It is late September as I write this. I expect that during October we were able to pull out our spent annuals and attack the worst of our weeds before they went to seed. With 2020 winding down, it's not too early to begin planning our gardens for 2021:

- We will do our Spring Flower Sale again in 2021.

 Details will follow in the March newsletter, but expect that the assortment of flowers available will be similar to this year with an order deadline in April and delivery in mid-May. The flower sale is a nice fundraiser for BHCF and also allows us to purchase our community garden annuals at wholesale price, to say nothing of the benefits to our home gardens. Also, keep your eyes out for a BHCF fundraiser of holiday wreaths and poinsettias. Info should be available soon if not in this very newsletter.
- Expect that May will be a month of preparation and planting activity at our gardens, but also expect that some prep work will occur as soon as the weather breaks. It's never too early to clean up litter and, if the weather allows, transplant perennials, trim shrubs and grasses, or dig weeds that overwintered.
 - We do need people to step forward as stewards for some of our gardens. A steward doesn't have to do everything but rather serves as the go-to person for that garden. A steward generally decides the type of plants for the garden, does as much or as little of the physical labor as they want, and schedules others to help if needed. Currently, Kim Larson serves as steward for Legion Park and coordinates a dedicated group who plants, weeds, and waters our garden gem. I handle the three Termon & California Avenues and PA 65 Gardens, Susan Benn handles the Goe Garden and coordinates the Harvard Circle plantings. Sue and Tim Maloney are my go-to people for Corona Corner. Recently, Cas and Steph Olszewski of California Avenue have stepped up to steward the Allegheny Mountains Garden at California Avenue opposite Benton Avenue. Someone (?) also appears to be taking care of the Antrim Street Rain Garden. Please let me know who you are so we can provide transplants if needed and let you know when things like the Phipps bulbs or Drew Mathieson hydrangeas and hibiscuses or other donations become available. That leaves the Great Wall along Brighton Heights Blvd. (mostly organizing litter cleanup and occasional weed control as a community project),


the planter boxes at the Kaboom Playground and the McClure Garden opposite Young's Tavern. Ideally, the steward lives near the garden to keep an eye out for what is needed, but this is not a requirement as our former steward for the McClure garden lived in Ross Township. Gardening expertise is also not required, just a desire to get involved.

- Due to job changes, Stacey Roa is leaving the BHCF Board. I can generally attend a Board meeting if necessary, but it is nice to have a Board member on the G & G committee to keep us posted on general business and/or concerns. Stacey expects to stay involved with the flower sale and other events as her work allows. Thank you, Stacey, for all that you and your family have done for our gardens over the past several years.
- We could use somebody with some plumbing skills to help with a few minor repairs to our water sources at our 3 T & C gardens.
- Since I am a hunt and peck typist with over 19,000 unread e-mails, we could also use someone to send out work day notices and the like to volunteers via Facebook, Next Door, etc. If you are interested, I promise to not make you dance on TikTok.

Finally, with the gardens down for the winter, you may need to do something for fresh air and exercise to keep those gardening muscles toned. How about cleaning snow from your neighbor's sidewalk? We have a lot of school kids and pedestrians in BH. I'm sure they and their pooches as well as your neighbors will appreciate it.

Land Use Update

On Monday, October 5, Joe Glassbrenner and I joined Pittsburgh Parks Conservancy Watershed Task Force to walk through Woods Run. Starting at the site of the defunct SCI Pittsburgh, we discussed issues ranging from uses for the SCI site to storm water handling in the Woods Run Corridor.

At the event, PWSA representatives explained the impact of Alcosan's approved Consent Decree on PWSA's planned CSO (combined sewer overflow) projects, which includes the St. John's site on McClure Avenue. With the approval of the Alcosan Consent decree, PWSA's projects are no longer deemed necessary to prevent sewage overflows due to inclement weather and PWSA's plans for the McClure Ave site have been put on hold for the time being.

While Alcosan's Clean Water Plan is expected to improve their ability to handle larger inflows of water, there is the potential that localized flooding and stormwater backups still exist in Brighton Heights. In order to determine the current impact of sewage issues in the area, PWSA has created a survey, https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/7KTZBKM, to gather feedback from residents of Brighton Heights. Please go to the link and fill out the survey, as we need responses to enable discussions with PWSA to finalize plans for the site and other watersheds.

REAL ID Is Back — And Here's What You Need To Know

Hello. I've received a number of questions on this topic, and so I wanted to let people know the latest about REAL ID.

This program was suspended during the worst of the COVID pandemic but is now back open for applications.

The new deadline to obtain a REAL ID is now October of next year (2021). REAL ID is a federal law that affects how states, like Pennsylvania, issue driver's licenses and ID cards if they're going to be acceptable for federal purposes, such as boarding a domestic airline flight or entering a military base or federal facility that requires ID.

Beginning on October 1, 2021, you will need to have a REAL ID-compliant driver's license or ID card, a valid U.S. Passport or military ID in order to board a domestic commercial flight or enter a secure federal facility (including a military installation).

You DO NOT need a REAL ID to enter the post office. REAL ID is optional; it is not required for any Pennsylvania resident. You can obtain a REAL ID driver's license or ID card or a standard driver's license or identification card through PennDOT.

It is Time to Come "Clean" About Coronavirus and Transmission from Hard Surfaces

You have probably seen an article or two about the Coronavirus and how it can be transmitted from a hard surface to a person. This could happen if an individual touched the surface and then touched their eyes, nose, or mouth. Is this really occurring or is it just speculation? I think it is time we examine the facts about how likely this could actually occur.

A chart posted in August by the Cleveland Clinic showed how long the virus can stay on a surface: Glass – 5 days. Wood – 4 days. Plastic and stainless steel – 3 days. Cardboard less than 24 hours. Cloth surfaces or carpeting – possibly hours.

At first glance, this seems to be alarming. Dig a little deeper and you will find that it is very unlikely that the virus will be transferred from a hard surface to a person." Viruses cannot survive without a living host and the virus starts to die very quickly on a hard surface", says infectious disease expert, Dr. Esper. There may be a trace of the virus after a few hours or days, but it is thousands of times less than what was originally deposited on the surface from the start. Just because the virus is detectable on a surface does not mean there is enough of it to make someone sick. Scientists are still trying to figure out what the infectious dose requirement is to cause an infection. Stay tuned for more up to date facts as they come out.

We should continue to clean and disinfect hard surfaces on a regular basis. There is no reason to stop doing that. We want to be as safe as possible. We just don't need to go overboard when it comes to disinfecting, especially when it comes to soft porous surfaces like carpeting and cloth-covered surfaces. I see too many companies trying to take advantage of people during this crisis by playing on their fears. Some of the advertisements that I have seen with workers in full hazmat suits spraying everything down is an example of what I am talking about. This is unnecessary and a waste of time and resources.

The bottom line is that the cleaning industry needs to be more educated and transparent about the virus and communicate this information accurately to their clients, so they can make an informed decision about what to do.

City Announces Three Neighborhood Hard-to-Recvcle Collection Events This Fall

TVs, computers, paints, batteries, light bulbs, chemicals, OH MY! In partnership with Environmental Coordination Services & Recycling (ECS&R), the City of Pittsburgh will host three neighborhood events on Saturdays this fall for the collection of electronic waste and household hazardous waste (e.g. TVs, computers, paints, batteries, light bulbs, chemicals and more).

One last event is scheduled from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Southside; advance registration is required. Registration for a five-minute appointment can be done online at ecsr.net/ pittsburgh-recycling and selecting the preferred event, or by calling the City's 311 lines.

SOUTHSIDE COLLECTION

(CITY COUNCIL DISTRICT 3) DATE: November 7, 2020

LOCATION: Three Rivers Heritage Trail

Turnaround, 15203

Participants are required to drive to the event location and must remain in their vehicles for the duration of their visit. Social distancing guidelines will be followed for this event and face masks are required.

Each event will be able to serve up to 240 people.

The City subsidizes the cost of recycling electronics and household hazardous waste, but fees do apply for most items. Accepted materials and fees can be found here on FCS&R's website

Dear Neighbors,

With autumn in full swing, we're excited to be able to welcome you back into our buildings. All branches are now open for limited in-person services, including 30-minute-long computer sessions, printing, picking up and placing holds, and applying for a library card. 
While our locations may look different on the inside, the heart of the Library hasn't changed. We look forward to connecting and discovering with you in new ways. Together, let's have a great fall!

Spiced Honeycrisp Apple Fritters with Vanilla Coffee Glaze

If you are heading out apple picking this fall, make these fritters!

Fritter Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour (or gluten-free flour)
- · 2 tsp baking power
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp ginger
- 1/4 tsp nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp kosher salt
- · 2 large eggs
- · 2 Tbsp salted butter, melted
- 1/2 cup whole milk (more if needed)
- 1 Tbsp real maple syrup
- · 3-4 Honeycrisp apples, peeled (if desired) and chopped

Vanilla Coffee Glaze Ingredients:

- 1 1/3 cups powdered sugar
- 1/4 cup whole milk
- 1-2 tablespoons real maple syrup
- · 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- · 2-3 teaspoons instant coffee
- · flaky sea salt



Instructions:

- 1. In a medium bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, and salt. Add the eggs, butter, milk, and maple syrup, and mix until just combined, being careful not to over mix the batter. If the batter feels thick, add up to 1/4 cup milk to thin. Fold in the apples.
- 2. Heat 1-2 inches of oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat (375° 449° F). Drop tablespoon size balls of batter into the oil for 4-5 minutes or until golden and crisp on all sides. Remove and drain on a wire rack with paper towels underneath.
- 3. To make the glaze, whisk together the powdered sugar, milk, maple syrup, vanilla, and coffee powder. Add a pinch of flaky sea salt. Drizzle the glaze over the warm fritters. Eat warm. And enjoy.
