I'd like to thank these men and the entire force for working around the clock to keep our streets safe.

- You are invited to attend the Federation General Membership Meetings every second Thursday usually located in the auditorium of John Morrow School. Police officers from Zone 1 provide a comprehensive list of every crime that occurs within our neighborhood. The next scheduled meeting will also be held in January.

The best way to prevent crime in our neighborhood is to become involved.

A Message from the BHCF Board of Directors

The Brighton Heights Citizens Federation Board of Directors would like to sincerely apologize for exposing the Federation's members, neighbors and friends to the offensive language and disrespectful behavior of an individual in attendance at the November General Membership Zoom Meeting, held on November 12, 2020. Please know this type of behavior will not be tolerated. As a Board, we are working diligently to ensure future meetings are conducted in a welcoming, respectful and safe environment for everyone in attendance.

Bylaw Update

The Brighton Heights Citizens Federation has had to adapt to pandemic life, just like many of you. We have worked on new ways of conducting business and we've also had to shift the needs we address in our community. One example is how we conduct meetings. We have moved all of our Board meetings and General Membership meetings to a remote format to follow CDC guidelines. Since this is a new process, we want to make sure taking attendance, voting, discussions, and all formalities are handled correctly, in accordance with our own bylaws and according to PA state laws.

After a contested vote and discussion at the November General Membership meeting on changes to our bylaws to allow remote meetings, votes, and attendance requirements, we decided to table the motion and consult with other community groups in our situation. After consulting, we decided it would be better to create relevant policies for the General Membership's understanding. These new policies will clarify issues regarding virtual meetings, attendance, and voting.

Thank you for your patience as we work on drafting a new policy to present in 2021.

Results of the November Board of Directors Election

As described in the November newsletter at their October meeting, the Board of Directors passed a motion to have the November Board of Directors election conducted by mail, using a ballot contained in the November newsletter. From Councilman Bobby Wilson

Hello everyone, I hope everyone had a joyous and safe holiday season! As we start 2021, I'd like to look back on the work we did in my first year as your Councilman. Though COVID-19 tried to slow us down, 2020 was a busy year. My staff and I worked with over 450 residents on all types of concerns in their neighborhoods. I was especially proud to have partnered with Cityview Church and the University of Pittsburgh to distribute essential needs packages to local senior high-rises when these items were difficult to come by. Whether constituents reached out by phone, email, or social media, we've done our best to follow up with everyone every time and work to get their questions answered or their issues resolved. It's been an honor and a privilege to serve you, and I'd like to take a moment to share some of the highlights of what we've accomplished in the Northside so far.

One of the most common asks from my Council District 1 was for traffic calming measures. These are steps the City's Department of Mobility & Infrastructure (DOMI) takes to slow down speeding cars. Many of you will think of speed humps as the most obvious traffic calming measures, but there are many other things, like restriping lanes, painting crosswalks, or adding bump-outs, that the City can do to make a fast street slower. Our first traffic calming project happened on Venture Street in Observatory Hill. There, DOMI installed a series of speed humps to slow cars as they came down the hill through the residential neighborhood to get on I-279. These speed humps cost \$47,000 and the process for getting them installed started in October 2019, when we helped a concerned resident apply for traffic calming for Venture Street through DOMI's Neighborhood Traffic Calming Program (https://pittsburghpa.gov/domi/ traffic-calming). The speed humps were installed in August of 2020, and everything we learned about getting such measures to slow down speeding cars has been put to good use launching over a dozen other traffic calming projects. Of these, the most important project is the one to slow down cars on California Avenue in your neighborhood. California Avenue is very unsafe because people drive way too fast. There were several scary accidents on that road just in the last six months. Right now, I am working with DOMI to have a planner come with me to your community group's meeting this month to explain what the City shall do to slow cars down and make California Avenue safer. I am also working with Zone 1 Police to take immediate steps to deter speeding on California Avenue until DOMI can install some traffic calming measures on that road.

When I was campaigning for City Council, I had hundreds of conversations with Northsiders about paving. I know how aggravating it can be to drive a road that has long been neglected, and as soon as paving season began last spring, I

got in my car and drove every Northside street on the paving list. The City spent \$1.9 million on paving in the District last spring and summer. There is plenty of paving left to do, and we still have a long list of paving requests that we will work to fulfill during this year's paving season.

Dealing with paving also taught me the importance of managing stormwater if we want to maintain our roads and hillsides. If we do not control where water flows, then it will cause landslides on our properties and erode our roads. Dealing with stormwater requires working with DOMI, the Department of Public Works (DPW), and the Pittsburgh Water & Sewer Authority. Building relationships with the directors and staffs of all these agencies allowed me to solve multiple stormwater issues for residents in Summer Hill, Spring Hill, and Wyona Way right here in Brighton Heights by adding catch basins, regrading street surfaces, and installing wedge curbs.

As many of you know, landslides have been a huge problem in the Northside. Thanks to the advocacy of the Friends of Riverview Park, Mayor Peduto prioritized \$1.8 million for landslide repairs in our great regional park. We will first repair the landslide that caused Riverview Avenue by the Chapel Shelter to crumble. Also, I asked that the Northside's 34 parks be put on a more regular maintenance schedule, which resulted in the addition of six DPW crew members to the Northern Division.

Finally, I am proud to announce the allocation of \$60,000 in Public Service grants to organizations that provide essential services across the Northside. Recipients of these grants included Cityview Church, Northside Common Ministries Food Pantry, Sarah Heinz House, Northside Chamber of Commerce, and the Northside Chronicle. I was also pleased to allocate \$80,000 in Neighborhood Economic Development grants to boost the development of affordable housing in the Northside.

While my husband and I were in the first year of dating, we both realized that we both had a love for birds. It wasn't a formal hobby for either of us at the time, but we started to slowly dabble, and signed up for a birding hike with the Audubon Society that fall. We purchased binoculars the night before and showed up excited! We quickly learned two things. First, all those little brown birds that you think you see in the tree, are oftentimes colorful and exotic when you see them through binoculars. Second, we learned that we were terrible at birding. The people on this hike knew bird songs and behavior, and could spot them very easily because they understood all of those things. We, – well, mostly me – missed 75% of the birds that everyone else was seeing. Frustrated for sure, I was still inspired by all the life that is constantly surrounding us whether we can see it or not.

That was about three years ago, and since then we have gone through a few migration seasons and have learned quite a bit about birds. Birding is paying attention, taking things slowly, and looking closely. You learn not just about birds, but also seasons, flowers, plants, and the environment.

Birds are an incredible indicator species that can tell us, generally speaking, how healthy our world is. Being able to see birds in Pittsburgh that have traveled from far away places like South America has been thrilling. I have also learned photography which has made the hobby especially fun. While we have seen some awesome birds in Riverview Park, Frick Park is a serious birding hot spot and a good way to get started. You will often see a birder or two, who are often more than willing to share what they saw that day and where. There are many times that we have gone out for a hike without seeing interesting birds, but it is never a waste. I think it does something good for the soul to just walk, look, and listen to the world around us.

Safety, Please

This last year has no doubt been extremely challenging for children and teens who are limited in being able to just be kids, but we need to make sure that no child in Brighton Heights needlessly dies in the name of being a kid or having fun. I am writing this because I personally came within inches of running over two small children this fall who were both riding a mini-motorcycle on the wrong side of the road, at night, with no helmets, and no lights. Their saving grace was that I am a notoriously slow driver on back streets, which can't be said for many drivers. It was a terrifying ordeal for both of us, but the kids sped off before I could talk to them about it.

Technically, in Pennsylvania, those really fun looking mini motorized bikes and small scooters are most likely not street legal, and should only be ridden on private property, with expressed permission from the property owner. If children in your care are going to ride **ANY** bikes, motorized or not, legal or not, with two, three, or four wheels (I'm really not judging!) please, please, please consider at least putting some bike lights, reflective clothing, and helmets on the kids. It takes very little to do lasting, or God forbid, lethal damage to a human head and bones!

Christmas Tree Recycling Program

Artificial Christmas trees are easy (some of them even come pre-lit), but some of us love the smell of the real thing – even if that means vacuuming pine needles off the carpet every day for weeks. If you're reading this newsletter, we're already well into 2020. So what can you do if you bought a fresh tree for the holidays and now need to get rid of it?

If you put your Christmas tree on the curb, it will be taken to a landfill. But the City of Pittsburgh Department of Public Works runs a Christmas Tree Recycling Program and it runs from December 26, 2020, through January 26, 2021 (seven days a week) from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. It provides a "sustainable alternative for residents to dispose of their trees."

First, you must remove all decorations. Then, bring it to a dropoff location. There's one right here in Brighton Heights at 1st Division of Public Works located at 300 Kilbuck Road.

Yes, it's a hassle to drag your tree to another location when you've already spent hours packing up all the ornaments. But every tree brought to a recycling location will be wood chipped into mulch and the City will offer free mulch to residents for four Saturdays in the spring. Participating in this program will keep a tree out of a landfill – over 36 tons of trees were diverted last year. And gardeners will be thrilled to use your Christmas mulch in the spring!
