Its goal is to share the goodness of gardening by bringing a plant or taking a plant to the park. The only requirement is to commit to planting and enjoy watching it grow. Thank you to Kim for setting up this day outside. I will see you there.

Our third spring event and first of its kind is outlined in this newsletter and is the "Build Your Wealth in the Trades" Building Trades Initiative. In October of 2020, my motion was approved by the Board of Directors to organize a new kind of event this spring for teens and young adults to explore opportunities in the skilled trades. Our final event is the Garden and Greenspaces that come around each year. Please see the article outlining the events and dates as detailed by Chairman Ed Gergerich. The committee has had continued success not only by keeping Brighton Heights "blooming", but also managing a great spring flower sale. Thanks to Stacey Roa and Jena Simpson, we are once again providing residents with greenhouse-quality plants and helping the BHCF with fundraising too. On the subject of planting and growing, the City of Pittsburgh Christmas Tree Recycle Program has made pine chips available to residents at the lower entrance to Riverview Park. This is the Public Works area at the end of Grand Ave. The chips are available from April 10 – May 10. Please bring your own shovel, buckets, or bins. You will have to load the chips yourself.

Last, I share a message from the Board of Directors Meeting on March 3, 2021. Due to the reduced funding our organization has suffered over the past 2 years, the BHCF Board has made the recommendations to close the physical office located at 3629 California Ave. An exact date has not yet been determined. Without the support and resources the BHCF was accustomed to in previous years, it is just not possible to maintain the expense of rent and utilities along with our insurance costs. Please continue to follow our meetings and newsletters as we make final decisions in the coming months to consider the most effective way to serve the residents of Brighton Heights. #### **From Councilman Bobby Wilson**

Hello everyone,

As we head into the warmer months of this year, I wanted to share information about making our streets safer and providing opportunities for young adults in our neighborhoods.

#### **OFF ROAD VEHICLES**

Off road vehicles have always been a challenge in the district, but I know we all have noticed the uptick in usage since the start of the pandemic. Thank you to the residents that have taken the time to reach out to our office to express concerns and share information. I'm sure many of you saw or heard the noisy parades of ATVs and dirt bikes, ranging from 50 to 200 riders, that tore through our Northside neighborhoods last summer. These all-terrain vehicles are not designed to be driven on public roads and they pose a serious danger to the general public, law enforcement, and the illegal riders themselves. In January, I spoke out in the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette about the need to find creative solutions to get these unlawful off-road vehicles off our streets and out of our neighborhoods. I am urging ATV riders to please find responsible places to use these vehicles, off of public streets, and I am especially asking families to please keep your kids from riding these vehicles in our public streets.

Recently, the Mayor assembled a task-force to devise a comprehensive operational plan to address this issue. The three-pronged response will focus on (1) education and community outreach, (2) law enforcement collaboration, and (3) investigation and enforcement. As part of the investigative process, the Pittsburgh Bureau of Police and its law enforcement partners will utilize any available technology to stop these unauthorized vehicles from driving on city streets. Residents can help by reporting any relevant tips or information. Please use the "Patrol" 311 ticket type on 311's online submission form, call 3-1-1, or tweet @311pgh. You may also submit tips directly to the police at 412\_TIPS@ pittsburghpa.gov. In the event of an emergency, as always, please dial 911.

#### PAID SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT

If you are between the ages of 14-21 or a relative, teacher, or mentor to a teen or young adult who is looking for a job this summer, check out the Learn & Earn Summer Youth Employment Program! Learn & Earn is a six-week summer employment program for teens and young adults in Allegheny County. Participants could work up to 25 hours per week. If you participate in this program, you have the opportunity to earn money, gain valuable work experience, and develop soft skills to help you become college and career ready. Past participants have planted urban gardens, created websites and business plans, conducted research, and helped run businesses. For many young adults, Learn &

Earn is their first job experience; for others, it has become their consistent summer job. Hear from real community members about their path to success, the great pay, reliable benefits, and rewarding opportunities that await you. Apprenticeship opportunities will be presented. Literature will be distributed to those interested and representatives be available to discuss the careers available in our region.

The day will conclude with a free tool raffle, as well as pizza and a sandwich ring for lunch. Pizza will be from a local Pizzeria and sandwich rings from Tom Fridays. In case you haven't noticed, **SPRING HAS SPRUNG!** And blooms dispel glooms!

Thanks to everyone who ordered flowers through our BHCF flower sale. Your purchases, even for your own yard, will make the entire neighborhood bloom!

May is a busy month in the community gardens. Two events are occurring on **SATURDAY**, **MAY 8** (and yes, you can do both)! The PA 65 Garden at Brighton Heights Blvd opposite the McKees Rocks Bridge will be planted starting at 9 a.m. WPC provides the flowers and mulch for our gateway garden. This year, we will have 19 flats of vincas, celosia, and rudbeckia to plant and mulch. Also on **SATURDAY**, **MAY 8** is our 2nd annual Plant Exchange at Legion Park from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Pick up or donate plants, surplus garden tools, pots, or seeds. If you have questions about the exchange or want to join the Legion Park Garden team, contact Kim Larsen at **412-818-8876**.

**SATURDAY, MAY 15**, is prep day at Legion Park and our three gardens at Termon and California Avenues. We will be transplanting perennials and ornamental grasses, trimming shrubs, and getting a head start on weeds before we plant our annuals on **SATURDAY, MAY 22**. A catch-up day will be **SATURDAY, MAY 29**, to work on anything that we didn't get done on the previous two Saturdays (usually mulching). These events start at 9 a.m. but latecomers are always welcome. We will go until about noon or until fatigue sets in.

We will have major tools available for these Saturdays but bring your favorite hand tool if you can. At this time, we don't know what our region's COVID status is going to be, but safety is always our primary concern. Bring your face mask although you may not need it as most tasks will be socially-distanced and I can guarantee that they will all be outdoors.

One event that is not on a Saturday is our flower delivery, taking place on **THURSDAY**, **MAY 20**. Mussigs will deliver our order to my house, 1632 Termon Avenue about 10 a.m. If you can help unload, sort orders, or deliver orders, even for a short time, it would be greatly appreciated. Last year we had over 100 flats plus pots and baskets that were sorted and delivered on the first day thanks to about a dozen helpers.



- McClure Garden at McClure and Woods Run Avenues
- Harvard Circle Plantings opposite Goe Avenue plus around the Circle

#### Pittsburgh Police Community Engagement Walk

On Saturday February 27, 2021, the Pittsburgh Bureau of Police held an impromptu community walk. The details came together quickly but its purpose was clear. Members of the Bureau had organized a walk in Brighton Heights to engage with the community in the areas they police. Approximately 15 officers showed up this day, including Chief Scott Schubert, who in March completed his initiative to walk all 90 Neighborhoods in Pittsburgh.

The event started on the California Ave Business District with a prayer by Revered Marla Roebuck of Destiny of Faith Church. During a briefing by Sgt Michael Burford, he named the new Neighborhood Resource Officer Eric DeFeo. The walk consisted of meeting residents, listening to concerns, and learning the Neighborhood. Officers engaged with over 30 residents and received thanks from those they encountered. A future walk was discussed with the intention of advanced planning and a welcoming of more residents to take part. Details will be provided in advance of another walk.

#### **Brighton Heights Plant Swap-or-Adopt**

It's Spring, the birds are singing, the grass is growing and it's time to think about gardening. Kim and Megan Larsen-Graham want to help everyone enjoy gardening as much as they do. What started out last March by putting some baby houseplants on the sidewalk with a sign that said "Free Quarantine Companion", has bloomed to a full plant exchange at their home last May. The response was so amazing. So many people brought plants and decided to take a plant home to start a garden. They are doing it again this year. They are proud to announce the second (hopefully annual) Brighton Heights Plant Swap-or-Adopt.

For a little more elbow room and to promote social distancing, the event will be at Legion Memorial Park this year. For those not familiar with the park, it is located at the intersection of Brighton Road, Davis Ave and Shadeland Ave. This location offers space to spread some plants for swapping. The Plant Swap-or-Adopt will be held on Saturday, May 8th, starting 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. or until all the plants find good homes.

The avid gardeners in our neighborhood have already combated the winter doldrums by starting vegetable seeds indoors. A great thing to do, but often once they start to grow, we realize that we have more plants then we have room for in the garden. If this has happened to you, bring your extra seedlings to the swap. If you are dividing the plants in your yard and have nowhere to put them, bring them to the swap. If your ivy has taken over your patio, dig it up and bring it to the swap. If you have too much of anything garden-related (seeds, tools, pots, other supplies), bring them to the swap.

The phrase "or adopt" has been added to the name, because it can't be said enough: You don't have to bring anything to take something. The plants are in need of homes. If you are thinking about starting to garden, come and get some free plants; but fair warning: it might lead to you planting seeds in the middle of winter for the next year's hopeful plant swap.

#### **MINUTES**

#### **Review of Previous General Membership Meeting**

Due to the restrictions during the COVID -19 pandemic, this meeting was held online using the Zoom platform. The public was invited to participate via computer or phone by a notice in the newsletter, website and social media accounts.

#### March 11, 2021

The meeting was brought to order at 7:05 p.m.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The Minutes from the January 14, 2021, General Membership meeting were approved without corrections.

#### **Special Guests:**

#### Pittsburgh Police Commander Linda Barone, Commander William Fleske, Sgt. Mike Burford, Officer Eric DeFeo, Officer Derrick Payton

The meeting started with a 20-minute presentation and resident Q&A on crime and safety in the neighborhood. Police presented current statistics and outlined the additional arrests they are making to work against these issues. Police were positive in their comments about the involvement of neighborhood residents during a community walk held last month and another is to be scheduled. Our new Neighborhood Resource Officer Eric DeFeo was introduced and he gave members and the public his cell phone number (412-551-4976) for citizens to call or text with information or concerns

#### City Councilman Bobby Wilson Mohammed Burney

Chief of Staff Burney detailed the Councilman's column in the Chronicle spotlighting the current utility and rent assistance programs. He also reported on the replacement of windows at the Senior Center on McClure Avenue. This is part of the rehabilitation of the

building, which will cost a total of \$2.5 million. Grants and other funding are being sought with a design process hopefully starting later this year and BHCF will be a part of the process. Construction is still a year or so off. Money is also being sought in various phases for the design and construction of the Davis Avenue pedestrian bridge, which also has a several year timeline.

#### PA Representative Emily Kinkead Bridget Barrett

Bridget introduced herself as chief of staff for Representative Kinkead. She detailed efforts the office is making concerning property tax rebate applications and a new rent assistance program that is starting next week. The phone number for the office is the same: 412-321-5523.

#### Public Safety John Tokarski

John reported on both the Citizen Police Academy and Student Police Academy programs which will be held starting June 22. He is coordinating efforts for this year's National Night Out in August and has been assisting member Richelle Ferree in forming a new block watch group.

## Allegheny Land Trust Alyson Fearon and Damon Weiss

Alyson and Damon made a presentation of construction drawings concerning the greenspace project at the St John's site as reported in the newsletter.

Community input will be sought via a survey mailer for some areas of the site that are still to be determined, but with this design ALT can start fundraising through grants and foundations. They plan to fundraise throughout 2021 for the approximate \$1 million cost. They hope to start construction in 2022.
