

At the April BHCF Board meeting, we had one nomination for award and one new board member appointed. Regina Kolodziej was appointed to serve a 2-year term as a board member. Regina has been regularly attending both General Membership meetings and Board meetings. She has filled in many times as recording secretary to record our board minutes prior to Todd McCollum stepping into the role. She has provided great insight and is an employee of Allegheny Health Network. I invited Larry Ehrlich to present a nomination for the Northside Leadership Conference Scholarship Dinner "Neighbor Awardee". Each year the BHCF board nominates a business or individual for this annual award. As promised at the original development meeting, I will give updates on the project timeline and details at each General Membership meeting going forward. Should our in-person walk-thru take place after the May 11 meeting, I will still have an updated report on the timeline for you all.

I want to wish those a Happy Mother's Day on May 14. Especially my own wife Taylor, who on March 22, blessed our family with another healthy baby boy, Felix Thomas. Thank you for the many congratulations I have received. I will also ask you to honor those who gave the ultimate sacrifice for our Country on Memorial Day, May 29. A great way would be to attend our Memorial Day Ceremony at Legion Park. As a reminder: our General Membership Meeting is May 11 at John Morrow School Auditorium at 7:00 p.m.

Attend a Stormwater Conversation!

PWSA HOSTS SERIES OF WORKSHOPS TO GATHER FEEDBACK AND ADDRESS STORMWATER CHALLENGES HEAD ON

This spring, the Pittsburgh Water and Sewer Authority (PWSA) is hosting Stormwater Conversations – a series of six community workshops taking place across Pittsburgh to gather feedback about the stormwater strategic planning initiatives underway and hear firsthand how stormwater impacts you.

The first of the Stormwater Conversations will take place on **THURSDAY**, **APRIL 13**, in the West End. They'll continue through early June, ending with the final workshop on **TUESDAY**, **JUNE 6**, in the Hill District. Workshops are from 6:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m.

THE CRITICAL TASK OF MANAGING STORMWATER IN PGH

Here in Pittsburgh, we have a stormwater management problem. In simple terms, our sewer system was not built to handle increasing amounts of rain. It was built for a different time, one where there was more greenspace and less of the city was paved over. Now, due to the impacts caused by climate change and more impervious surface area, there is nowhere for the water to go.

Many know what happens next: when rain falls quickly, it can overwhelm our sewer system, cause basements to backup, and pollute our rivers and streams.

That's why PWSA is addressing our region's stormwater challenges head on. Make no mistake that this is important work: the decisions we make today to manage stormwater will shape the future of our neighborhoods, protect our rivers, and help us better prepare for climate change.

ABOUT THE STORMWATER STRATEGIC PLAN

Late last year, PWSA released the Stormwater Strategic Plan, the first phase of a long-term planning effort to address local stormwater challenges. The plan considers prevalent issues, such as neighborhood flooding and basement backups, while also looking through the lenses of equity and environmental justice.

Stormwater challenges impact many of our neighbors, and we

understand those challenges look different depending on where the customer lives. Whether you know a little or a lot about this issue, your input is valuable. It will help guide us on our stormwater journey and ensure we're considering the unique needs of our communities.

STORMWATER CONVERSATIONS: WHEN, WHERE, WHAT

We ask that you please join us for one of the six Stormwater Conversations we're hosting across Pittsburgh from mid-April through early June. Each session is geared toward specific neighborhoods in Pittsburgh, but feel free to join the session that works best for you.

Recognizing that everyone learns and receives information differently, we have designed these workshops to be engaging and interactive. We encourage you to take the time to explore, talk to your neighbors, and learn from our knowledgeable facilitators.

They are broken into three sections, giving participants time to learn at their own pace and participate in small group discussion with PWSA staff and our stormwater partners.

- 1. **Settle in and Explore** Upon arrival, take your time to settle in and visit educational stations focusing on important information you should know about Pittsburgh's sewer system, tips to improve water quality, and key terminology. Stop at a digital map to enter your experiences with stormwater.
- 2. **Setting the Framework** PWSA will provide a brief presentation about the Stormwater Strategic Plan and the concepts you should know.
- 3. Facilitated Table Conversations This is the main event! Attendees will break into small groups and rotate to three tables each focusing on the strategic priorities identified in the Plan. PWSA representatives and community stormwater partners will guide the conversation, answer questions, and gather any feedback you would like to provide.

We are providing ASL interpreters at each workshop, but when you register, let us know what other needs you may have so we can make your experience as easy and accessible as possible. Finally, we are serving tomato soup and grilled cheese - the quintessential comfort food to go along with rainy days.

The Stormwater Conversations are the first part of a

Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, e-scooters and e-bikes, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch on fire or explode.

The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1**.

Battery Disposal

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option.
- Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.

Charging an E-bike

Charge your battery in a flat, dry area away from children, direct sunlight, liquids, tripping hazards, and in a location where the e-bike is not at risk of falling.








Food Fridge Initiative

We have a few updates regarding the Food Fridge initiative. On May 13, through another Federation-sponsored event, Build your Wealth through the Trades, they will be building the pantry and creating an enclosure for the refrigerator. Again, we'd like to thank Pastor James with the New Life Family Worship center on the corner of Shadeland and Davis, for

donating the space. We are in the initial steps of reaching out to local businesses to obtain donations. We've also reached out to other local pantries and food non-profits to obtain advice and secure partnerships. Specifically, we are in initial talks with Trader Joe's,



412 Rescue, and other local businesses within Brighton Heights. While the refrigerator will be stocked with perishable items, we will be accepting items for the pantry as well. Some examples would be toilet paper, feminine products, toothpaste, diapers, etc. If you are interested in donating, you can bring the donation to any of the of our public Federation

meetings that happen every odd-numbered month (except July), on the second Thursday at 7:00 p.m. You can also mail a check to the Brighton Heights Citizen Federation address with "EMF Free Food Fridge" in the memo, the P.O. Box is 99602 Pittsburgh, PA 15233. We are starting a monetary fund to buy food for the project. Gardens & Greenspaces

HAPPY SPRING! Lots of good stuff has already occurred in our community gardens. In February, members of Boy Scout Troop 348, based at St. Cyril's and led by Eagle Scout candidate Eddie Adams, started on the Green-up and Adams Lots at Termon and California Avenues. The troop trimmed shrubs and ornamental grasses, cleared overgrowth from the sidewalks, and repainted the garden signs and rails. This got us a much earlier start than ever. In addition to Eddie the Eagle Scouts, the super troopers and adults included Glenn Patton, Derek Riley, Christopher Adams and Bill Kunz. Check out the great new look to the garden signs.

Don't worry, there is still a lot of things you can help with:

SATURDAY, MAY 6: starting at 9:00 a.m., we will be planting and mulching the Western PA Conservancy Garden at PA 65 and Brighton Heights Blvd. WPC supplies the flowers and mulch and tills the bed. We have 24 flats of Vinca, Celosia and Rudbeckia to plant and mulch. As with all of our work days, if you can't be there at 9:00 a.m., come later. We can always use as many volunteers as possible. If you drive, park at the top of the Great Wall and use the steps at Davis Avenue to get to the garden. I'll have tools and safety vests available, but if you have a favorite hand trowel, please bring it.

SATURDAY, MAY 13: will be prep day at Legion Park and the Termon and California 3 starting at 9:00 a.m. We will be transplanting perennials and preparing the flower beds for our annual infusion of annuals the following week.

Saturday, May 13 is also our third annual Plant Exchange at Legion Park from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. You can donate extra plants, seeds, tools, and garden equipment or pick up those items for free. *Did I mention everything is free?* You won't get a better deal.

SATURDAY, MAY 20: starting at 9:00 a.m., we will be planting and mulching annuals at Legion Park and the T&C 3.

SATURDAY, MAY 27: will be a catch-up day when we will be finishing up anything that didn't get done in the previous weeks, so all of the gardens will be in excellent shape for Memorial Day Monday.

Plant Swap or Adopt

It's happening again this Spring: this year's Annual Plant Swap or Adopt will be held at Legion Memorial Park, **SATURDAY**, **MAY 13**, from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

If your yard, living room or garden is overrun with plants, then bring them to share with others. If it's a plant or plant-related, bring it to the park on the Saturday and spread the joy of gardening.

Some of the highlights that I saw pass through the park last year were a grape vine, a tree of some sort (it arrived and was adopted before I even saw what kind), macramé plant holders, irises, lilies, lambs ears, tomato, pepper, squash and herb plants, seeds, lots and lots of sunflower seeds, tools, pots and even a garden gnome found a new garden to watch over.

Come join us! Whatever you bring will bring joy to someone and I'm sure that you'll find something that will bring you joy. One last thing, I can't say this enough; it is a Plant Swap but it's also a Plant Adopt – you don't have to bring anything to take something home. This is a free event, the only payment requested is that we see the smile on your face before you take your new plants home.

Brighton Heights Adopt-A-Block Program

PURPOSE OF ADOPT-A-BLOCK PROGRAM: To organize individuals and organizations to keep sidewalks, curbs, parking lots and greenspaces free of litter and debris. Good Friday Stations Walk

Christ Our Savior Parish, composed of the former St. Peter, St. Boniface, St. Francis/Risen Lord, and St. Cyril churches hosted a Stations of the Cross walk on Good Friday, April 7, 2023, through the Brighton Heights neighborhood. Area churches and citizens in the community were invited to join in the walk starting at noon at Brighton Heights Lutheran Church with Pastor Parker Kantos leading the first station. People in attendance took turns carrying the 8-feet high cross. People and families took part by volunteering to either carry the cross and/or lead the prayer at each stop. We stopped 14 times, corresponding with the 14 stops Jesus walked on his journey to Calvary. Reverend Gary Paladin from Bridge City Church, Vicar Bruce Robison from All Saints Episcopal Church, and Reverend Brenda Gregg from Destiny of Faith Church led prayer devotions and reflections outside of their respective churches. Residents of the Lynn Williams Senior Apartments on Brighton Road were invited to join in prayer, as they were one of the stops along the route. The final stop, the fourteenth station, concluded at Christ Our Savior Parish, St. Cyril's site with Reverend Larry DiNardo (Vicar General, Diocese of Pittsburgh) leading the devotion. Fr. Dam Nguyen, Parochial Vicar and Fr. Ferdinand Okafor, in residence from Christ Our Savior Parish, took part in this event and all were invited to attend the 1:30 p.m. solemn Good Friday service at Christ Our Savior Church/St. Cyril site.

We are grateful for our Pittsburgh Police, who showed up in full force as we walked California Avenue to Davis Avenue, Legion Park and down Brighton Road. There were at least ten police officers on motorcycles, as well as multiple officers in SUVs who took part in this community event and kept us safe during the walk. We are thankful for Joe Glassbrenner, President of Brighton Heights Citizens Federation who

advertised this event at a recent BHCF meeting. We are most grateful to all our church leaders and neighbors who took part in this event. It was refreshing to see diversity and unity in our community, and especially so many young people and families. This Good Friday walk was powerful and inspiring!

Next year, we hope to have more people and churches in Northside community take part in this walk on Good Friday. Since Christ Our Savior parish has three worship sites, we rotate events at each site every year. Next year's 2024 Good Friday walk may be from St. Boniface to St. Peters, through West Park depending on the Pittsburgh Pirates schedule. Those in attendance will be guided by skilled trades workers to construct a wooden structure for the Food Fridge Initiative, an outdoor outlet, exterior lighting, as well as become familiar with identifying the correct tools for the task and their use. Keeping our Community Safe

If it seems a week doesn't go by where we learn of a mass shooting somewhere in the country, that's because unfortunately, it doesn't. So far in 2023, there have been more mass shootings in the United States than days of the year. Sadly, in light of this data, many are becoming numb to this out-of-control epidemic of violence and feel helpless.

As everyone knows, in October, the Brighton Heights community experienced a mass shooting in the middle of the day, outside of the Destiny of Faith Church, during a funeral service. Official reports indicated that five individuals were wounded and subsequently two arrests were made.

What the reports don't show is the trauma inflicted on the congregation, all their partners, and the entire Brighton Heights community. Destiny of Faith is a church, a faithbased ministry that addresses the needs of the entire family and community through education, outreach, service and stewardship. The church hosts a wide range of events and programs, including weekly services, support groups, and volunteer opportunities. It is supposed to be a safe space, a place where all are welcome and the community can come together to pray, practice their faith, receive services, and enjoy each other's company.

Shortly after this horrific incident, my office worked with Project Destiny, an affiliate of Destiny of Faith, to apply for a Nonprofit Security Grant offered through the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency. This program was established by the Pennsylvania General Assembly following the Tree of Life synagogue shooting in Squirrel Hill in 2018. Nonprofit Security Grants are intended to fund security enhancements for nonprofit organizations who principally serve individuals, groups, or institutions that could be targeted for hate crimes, as identified by the FBI's Hate Crime Statistics Publication.

I am pleased that Destiny of Faith was awarded nearly \$50,000 in funding to make a series of security enhancements. This was an extremely competitive round of funding with only 32 of 444 applications statewide being funded. I am proud I was able to help Destiny of Faith and commend them on their efforts in pursuing these funds to help ensure the safety of everyone who attends programming at the church.

While this is great news for Destiny of Faith and the community at large, it alone will not solve the challenges we face in making our communities safe. There are too many people with access to guns who should not have them, people with mental health issues and a preoccupation with violence. There are too many children with access to guns and as a result, firearms have now become the leading cause of death for children under the age of 19.

We need to invest in our children. We need to invest in their education. And we need to invest in their communities. No child should have an easier time getting their hands on a gun than on a book, a toy or a ball.

We undoubtedly need common sense gun safety reform. Nothing is more common sense than implementing Extreme Risk Protection Orders (ERPOs). That is why I have once again introduced legislation, Senate Bill 204, that would enact ERPOs in Pennsylvania.

Also known as "Red Flag Laws," ERPOs grant family members and law enforcement the ability to petition a court to temporarily suspend an individual's access to firearms if there is documented evidence that an individual is a threatening harm to themselves or others. The person subject to that order must surrender their guns to police and will not be able to buy, sell, or possess other firearms with a judge determining the time frame of this suspension not to exceed one year.

ERPOs are modeled after Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Protection Orders which gives due process and standards for evidence. After a family member files a petition, the court holds a hearing and determines whether the person poses a serious threat of violence to themselves or others. A judge can then issue an ERPO and can also refer the person in crisis for evaluation to ensure they get the help they need.

Today, 19 states and Washington D.C. have ERPO laws. Polling shows that a majority of Americans across party lines support red flag laws.

As the legislative session continues in Harrisburg, I will continue advocating for this common-sense law and any other measure that makes our communities safer.

From Councilman Bobby Wilson

Hello everyone! In this month's column, I wanted to share some major updates on projects in Brighton Heights and City-wide initiatives that affect us all.

I wanted to begin by sharing some great news on two infrastructure projects that I know are very important to Brighton Heights residents. First, construction bids will be sought for the Davis Avenue Bridge starting this month. The City's Department of Mobility & Infrastructure (DOMI) is anticipating that a contract with a construction company will be in place by this summer, with construction itself to begin in the latter half of this year. We are estimating that construction will conclude next year, with a tentative opening of this long-awaited bike-pedestrian bridge in early 2024. Second, I recently passed legislation to allocate \$200,000 for new fences and additional improvements to the baseball fields at Jack Stack Park in Brighton Heights. My office worked with the Northside Baseball and Softball Association to identify this need for investment in these ballfields. It is vital to the Brighton Heights and Northside community to upgrade these ballfields so that the youth baseball leagues that operate at these fields can continue to thrive and succeed.

I also wanted to share that the City of Pittsburgh recently announced a delay in the enforcement of the single-use plastic bag ban. The new date that this ban will go into effect is October 14, 2023. As a result, the City is also shifting the date when businesses would be required to post visible notices of the upcoming single-use plastic bag ban to 90 days before October 14. Council recently passed amendments to the legislation authorizing the ban on plastic bags that will also do the following:

- Add a requirement that the City launch and maintain a webpage dedicated to providing public information on the policy;
- Direct the Department of Public Works to cultivate and share lists of distributors for both compliant paper bags and reusable bags;
- · Create a three-step sanctions framework whereby inspectors can issue written warnings for initial violations which would then be followed by escalating fines.

Council approved these amendments in order to ensure that businesses and consumers have ample time and sufficient resources to make this transition from using plastic bags to sustainable and renewable forms of bags.

Finally, as summer draws near, I want to make sure all of you know that CitiParks is currently recruiting lifeguards for the 2023 Summer Season. Lifeguards are hired to work at CitiParks Aquatic Facility locations from June through Labor Day. CitiParks offers Lifeguard Certification Training courses prior to the season as well as recertification for experienced lifeguards. Candidates must have a Red Cross Lifeguard Certification valid through September 4, 2023, and additionally are required to submit criminal background clearances and pass a medical exam. Hourly pay rates have increased from last year and will range from \$16.48 - \$19.05 per hour, based on experience. Lifeguards must be City of Pittsburgh residents, at least 16 years old by September 5, 2023, and willing to work at any CitiParks Outdoor Pool. For anyone who is thinking about becoming a CitiParks Lifeguard, you can "pre-apply" by visiting this website, https://pittsburghpa.gov/citiparks/lifeguard-info. CitiParks Aquatics Office will then get in touch when applications open and the training classes/recertification classes are scheduled. We really need lifeguards at all the City pools this summer, and I encourage you to apply if you're interested!
