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From the Federation President

This was a summer that didn't stop for the BHCf. From Memorial Day on to our second-to-last Summer Series concert on September 6. There was so much to do and news to break.

I'll start my report with all the updates I have on projects. If you haven't heard yet: the Davis Ave Bike and Pedestrian Bridge opened on June 6. I was honored to be invited to the ribbon cutting to represent the BHCf and our residents. I delivered remarks that outlined the role the BHCf and residents had on this project becoming a reality. Residents projected their voices to the City Departments and elected officials to make it very clear this was a priority. This made our job easier to advocate for the project and a big win for Brighton Heights! Enjoy your new access to the 251 acres we call Riverview Park.

On July 24, I attended the California Ave Bridge Project Meeting. I can recap the meeting by saying that despite the projects delayed timeline of a 2025 start date, the city has committed to designing a full bridge renovation to the concrete, deck, and steel super-structure. The project should bid in 2027 with construction to start in 2028. Due to the heavy use and bus route, traffic will be maintained on one side at a time, using a temporary traffic signal and alternating traffic. This will eliminate the need for a detour. The project is currently in design and now is the time to submit any input you may have on

paint color or concrete patterns to be incorporated into the build. Just reach out to the BHCf or go to the Engage page under California Ave Bridge Rehabilitation.

The wait is over for one project. I've learned through a construction kickoff meeting that the BH Healthy Active Living Center construction is set to start this month. A contract was awarded to Massaro Construction as the general contractor to lead the \$5.6 million renovation. The completion date for this 16-month renovation is projected to be January 2027. At the time of this writing, I have not yet attended a meeting with PWSA that was facilitated by Councilman Wilson. The goal of this meeting is to express concerns over the unreliability of the water service in Brighton Heights, ask direct questions about the flaws in infrastructure, and lack of emergency preparedness. I will share what I learn from this meeting with you at the September General Membership Meeting.

Please join us on Thursday, September 11 at 7:00 p.m. at the John Morrow School Auditorium for our next General Membership Meeting. I hope you all had a Happy Labor Day.

And as always, I'll see you in the neighborhood.

Gardens and Greenspaces

Happy end of summer. The central theme for this year's community gardens has been "water woes." Early in the season, we had plenty of rain. Between the raindrops, we got everything planted and mulched in May. Thanks to Susan Benn, Janet and Wendell Martin and family, Bob Haller, and Amanda Doyle for their work at the PA-65 and the three Termon & California gardens.

The Adams Lot hasn't had a water source since former Representative Adam Ravenstahl's office has been vacant. If the Adams Lot needs water, we have to cart water across Brighton Heights Blvd. since running a hose across the heavy traffic is impractical. Similarly, since a recent change of the service lid, Kim Larsen, Megan Graham, and their legion of Legion Park volunteers have had to transport water across Brighton Road from their home since the oversized key from the original lid doesn't fit the new lid. We are looking at options to get our Legionaries a new key.

At the Greenup Lot, a plastic extension pipe on the off/on spigot broke over last winter. Fortunately, I was able to replace the spigot with a new one that didn't require the extension.

The worst water problem is occurring at the Western PA Conservancy Garden at PA-65 where the water was off for several weeks. It worked on our May 3rd Planting Day. Due to the early rains, the outage wasn't noticed until recently. At first it was not a problem, but then we started to lose annuals. WPC's Shawn Terrell brought one of their trucks to water the garden on August 5 and PWSA was able to fix the problem on August 7.

Finally, we have had a problem with people taking plants from some of our community gardens. This is not cool. Too many people have worked too hard to plant and maintain those gardens for the enjoyment of the community. There are times when some items might be available. For example, flower seeds at the end of the season or lambs' ears or ornamental grasses in early spring. In any case, always ask the garden steward before assuming something is available.

Despite the difficulties listed above, the gardens have looked pretty good throughout the season. Since April, daffodils, irises, and daylilies have each taken their turn dominating the landscape. Now, marigolds, rudbeckia, hydrangeas, and hibiscus are doing best. I guess doom and gloom is trumped by bloom. Mother Nature is a tough old broad.

Stay safe, stay green.

Community Garden Committee

We have a location! We have secured a space for the Brighton Heights Community Garden. The garden is located in the St. John's greenspace at 3325 McClure Avenue. It's right on the street, highly visible, fairly level, lots of sun, and parking nearby. The Allegheny Land Trust will be clearing out the remaining trees and planting evergreen shrubs along the side to provide a privacy screen for the neighbor. Once fully established, we envision providing fenced-in space for neighbors to develop gardens to make their own. If you always wanted to have a larger garden space and your property just didn't permit it, this is the perfect space for you.

Now that we have a location, our immediate need is funding. We're in the process of applying for grants, including Grow Pittsburgh's New Garden Support program. We welcome any volunteers and neighbors who can help with our fundraising efforts, have experience with applying for grants, or have ideas about additional funding sources.

We have a core committee of excited volunteers from all backgrounds, but we need a big and enthusiastic team to get this garden funded, designed, built, and growing! If you love gardening, whether that be vegetables or flowers, have some expertise in horticulture or just love to be out there helping things grow, come join us! Land Use Update

There is much going on in Brighton Heights and Pittsburgh in Land Use. BHCF has begun renovation of the final property we own on Fleming Avenue and we will look to sell and move in new neighbors soon. In July, DOMI hosted a meeting to update the neighborhood on the progress with the California Avenue Bridge. Design is ongoing and the main renovation is scheduled for 2028. More information will come as we get closer, but DOMI assured us that the bridge is currently safe to traverse.

As you all have probably noticed, the Rite Aid in the neighborhood closed in June. As of August, the lease has not yet been sold during the bankruptcy. BHCF Land Use will continue to look for new ways to use the building and welcome any and all suggestions. Following a final school board vote in November, the Morrow Elementary School on Davis is expected to close in June 2026. The Land Use Chair attended the Morrow closure meeting and asked for them to work with BHCF. Hopefully, with coordination between PPS and BHCF the school building will not be vacant for long.

Purple Alert System

Last January, a 17-year-old student, who has Down syndrome, went missing after a bus she was on dropped her off at school even though the school was closed that day. Without the ability to enter the building, the student continued to wander throughout the area. Over the next 24 hours, police and volunteers worked to retrace her steps trying to locate the teen. Although they were successful in finding the girl unharmed, there are many stories like this that don't have a positive ending.

Children with disabilities are particularly vulnerable when they go missing. Some are unable to communicate effectively or even nonverbal while others may gravitate to things that threaten their safety such as bodies of water, busy roadways or highways, or even vehicles like fire trucks and trains. The death rate of someone missing more than 72 hours with an intellectual or cognitive disability is as high as 88 percent.

I reintroduced legislation this session creating a "Purple Alert" system in Pennsylvania. Similar to an Amber Alert that is sent out for a missing person 17 years old or younger, my Senate Bill 307 would help authorities notify the public who can assist in locating a missing individual with an intellectual disability, regardless of their age.

Earlier this year, the Senate Law and Justice Committee unanimously passed my Purple Alert legislation. I am hopeful that as we move through the fall, the General Assembly moves this bill forward so this lifesaving measure is made a reality in Pennsylvania.

From Councilman Bobby Wilson

Hello Brighton Heights! I'd like to address the issue with Pittsburgh Water and the lack of reliable water service in the neighborhood. This is an unreasonable and unacceptable situation, and I will continue to work with Pittsburgh Water until it is

resolved. I had an initial meeting with the organization's leadership in July, where they acknowledge these issues and provided commitments for improvement. You can find my full statement at my Council webpage under Newsletters and Press Releases.

At the time of writing this article, a meeting is scheduled with BHCF President Joe Glassbrenner and Pgh2O to discuss next steps in community outreach. More details will be shared once that meeting occurs. Residents should continue to use the service outage map on the PGH2O's website for active water outages and report service disruptions to their 24/7 Emergency Dispatch **(412) 255-2423**, press 1.

Now that City Council has returned from recess, we will enter budget season when the Mayor's Office and the Office of Management and Budget present preliminary budgets for both operating and capital expenses to City Council early this fall. I would like to note that earlier this summer, I submitted over 30 capital budget requests totaling \$51 million dollars for District 1. Over \$5 million of those requests were for projects in Brighton Heights, including \$2 million towards various projects in Jack Stack Park, Brighton Heights Healthy Active Living Center, Shadeland and Davis Avenue Streetscape Plan, Brighton Heights Blvd Substructure, Elmhurst Landslide Remediation, and Brighton Rd & Woods Run Traffic Signal Upgrade. I look forward to reviewing the preliminary budget and advocating for all the pressing needs in Brighton Heights and all the neighborhoods in District 1.

I'm happy to share that this year's Riverview 5K has a Halloween Twist! This is the fifth and final event of the 2025 City of Pittsburgh Community Footrace Series presented by Allegheny Health Network and will take place on Friday, October 10 at 6:00 p.m. To learn more about the race and to register, visit <https://pittsburghpa.gov/events/riverview/index.html>.

Back to School in District 20: Nutrition, Savings & Policy for a Brighter Future

Happy back to school season! As we head into a new school year in increasingly challenging times, I'd like to highlight a few options for constituents to help

maximize relative state benefits and resources to keep kids in our region healthy and thriving! There is still more work to be done, but these programs paired with my proposed legislation to make school lunches free and available to every student in Pennsylvania are a great start to an even better future for all!

SUN Bucks: Fighting Summer Hunger in Pennsylvania

This past summer, Pennsylvania continued participation in the federal Summer EBT program, known locally as SUN Bucks, offering households up to \$120 per eligible child (\$40/month for three summer months) to purchase groceries when school meals aren't available. Most eligible children—those certified for SNAP, TANF, Medicaid, or who received free/reduced-price meals during the school year — are enrolled automatically. Families potentially eligible but not enrolled must apply by August 31 for summer 2025 benefits. If you have not participated in SNAP, TANF, or Medicaid, but want to see if your children qualify, please go to <https://www.pa.gov/agencies/dhs/resources/summer-ebt> and take the eligibility quiz. You will need to follow the prompts to apply for each child. Our office can assist if needed. Ideally, these funds should have been available during the summer, but due to a technical issue, SUNBucks will be distributed by the end of September. We thank you for your patience, and will continue to push for processes that deliver timely benefits!

PA 529 Plan & Keystone Scholars: Planning for College

With the cost of college tuition on the rise even in the PA State System of Higher Education schools, there is no time like the present to start saving for college now, no matter how old your kids are! Pennsylvania's PA 529 College & Career Savings Program offers two tax-advantaged accounts: the Guaranteed Savings Plan (GSP), which locks in current tuition rates, and the Investment Plan (IP), a Morningstar-Gold-rated choice.

Families with children born or adopted on or after January 1, 2019 automatically receive \$100 through the Keystone Scholars program — a seed fund to jumpstart education savings. Contributions are state-income-tax deductible in PA — even if you invest in another state's 529 plan — and funds don't count toward PA financial aid eligibility.

Proposed Legislation: Free School Lunch & Lunch Debt Relief

I am also the proud sponsor of HB 180, which aims to create a universal free school meals program (breakfast and lunch) for all Pennsylvania K-12 students regardless of income. This legislation was first introduced in 2022, with a projected annual cost of \$250 million at current federal funding levels and potentially up to \$500 million if federal nutrition funding decreases. It is my firm belief that no student should ever go hungry, nor should they ever be put in the humiliating situation of being turned away or worse, punished for not having enough money to pay for a meal. We have heard concerns regarding the necessity of making meals universally available regardless of need given that many students can pay for their own meals. My goal is to make sure that fluctuating economic situations do not cause undue burdens on families or school administrators who otherwise are forced to deal with eligibility requirements, application processes, and renewals. We don't make students, families or school districts jump through hoops like that for any other school supply, so why would we do it for the most needed school supply of all!?

That brings me to another bill I am proudly sponsoring, HB2180 which aims to create a fund to erase existing lunch debts and ban "lunch shaming" practices such as denying hot meals, public shaming, or restricting school activity access due to unpaid balances. Universal free meals have a proven success record of boosting academic outcomes, reducing stigma, and preserving the dignity of our families by ensuring that no child is denied a meal.

Bottom Line

As your District 20 representative, I am giving everything I've got to ensure no child goes hungry — through summer support like SUN Bucks, long-term education savings through PA 529, legislating free meals at school, and wiping out school lunch debt. These programs reflect a broader vision: strengthening families, improving learning outcomes, and investing in every child across Pennsylvania.
